Legislative Update

Council Meetings

As the Pueblo has begun to open up into our "new normal", Governor and Tribal Council have decided to allow Tribal Members to participate in meetings <u>in-person</u> beginning with the <u>June 10, 2022</u> Council Meeting.

The Tribal Council will be amending the meeting participation restrictions through Legislative Order. We realize that remaining vigilant is key however, conducting meetings in-person are an effective way of working and maintaining productivity for the People and Pueblo.

Catering Opportunities

With a new Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2022, there may be opportunities for community members to cater meetings for Tribal Council throughout the year. We welcome tribal/community members to submit their names and menus or meal options to the Legislative Office in order to develop a list of potential caterers.

Council Committee Updates

The Budget, Finance and Taxation Committee has worked diligently with the Administration to review a Proposed FY 2022-2023 Budget which is scheduled for action at a Council Meeting on June 10, 2022.

A Public Hearing regarding the Proposed FY 2022-2023 Budget was held on May 4, 2022 at 4:00 pm in which the budget was presented and questions by Tribal Members were welcomed during that time.

The Tribal Council and the Administration are working to evaluate and adopt a Wage & Compensation Scale to be able to offer competitive pay and create a standard minimum wage for Pueblo employees. This will ultimately allow the Pueblo to retain current employees and hire new employees in order to fill vacancies and continue providing the best of services to the community.



Random Laws

The Legislative Office will begin placing random laws in our newsletter to 1) remind the community of what laws currently exist in the Tribal Code and 2) to surface laws that may need to be revisited, amended, updated and etc.

Part 6.4.2 Budget Modification Process (amendment to the Fiscal Procedures Act of 2012)

6.4.2.010 Findings

- (a) The Council is authorized to make laws for the Pueblo pursuant to Section 5 of the Agreement;
- **(b)** Section 5(a)(ii)(A) of the Agreement requires the Pueblo to enact an Annual Budget which includes all projected revenues and expenditures;
- (c) Section 5(a)(ii)(C) requires that "no expenditure shall be made unless included in an approved budget";
- **(d)** Section 5(a)(ii)(A) requires that "Budget modifications by the Council shall be permitted no more than twice a year";
- **(e)** Section 5(a)(ii)(A) also states "provided, that budget modifications by the Council to obtain new grants, appropriate matching funds for new grants, or to expend new grant funds may be done at any time";
- **(f)** The budget modification process for newly acquired grants, new matching funds, and or new funds needs to be refined to ensure all budget modifications are properly tracked and implemented according to Section 5(a)(ii)(A) of the Agreement.

(September 14, 2015, SI-R15-026.)

6.4.2.020 Short Title

(a) This enactment shall be known as the Budget Modification Process Act.

(September 14, 2015, SI-R15-026.)

6.4.2.030 Purpose

(a) The purpose of this Act is to clarify the budget modification process permitted under the Governing Agreement ("Agreement") to distinguish between the two types of budget modifications which shall be called an Approved Funding Modification or a New Funding Modification.

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6.4.2.040 Findings

- (a) The Council finds that:
- (1) Section 5(a)(ii)(A) of the Agreement requires the Pueblo to enact an Annual Budget which includes all projected revenues and expenditures; and,
- (2) Section 5(a)(ii)(C) of the Agreement requires that "no expenditure shall be made unless included in an approved budget"; and,
- (3) Section 5(a)(ii)(A) of the Agreement requires that "Budget modifications by the Council shall be permitted no more than twice a year"; and,
- (4) Section 5(a)(ii)(A) of the Agreement also states "provided, that budget modifications by the Council to obtain new grants, appropriate matching funds for new grants, or to expend new grant funds may be done at any time"; and,
- (5) The budget modification process for newly acquired grants, new matching funds, and or new funds needs to be refined to ensure all budget modifications are properly tracked and implemented according to Section 5(a)(ii)(A) of the Agreement; and,
- **(6)** One component of the budget modification process will be to categorize all projected revenues included in the Pueblo's annual budget are considered as "approved" funding and that the annual budget can only be modified twice a year per the Agreement; and,
- (7) A second component of the budget modification process will be to categorize all newly acquired grants, appropriation of matching funds for new grants, and/or new funds that are considered "new" funding; and,
- **(8)** The annual budget may be modified at any time to include "new" funding, and that such a modification will not count toward the two budget modifications authorized per the Agreement; and,
- **(9)** The "Approved Funding Modification" designation for the two modifications allowed for all approved budgets and expenditures under the Annual Budget will be identified as "AFM-1 or "AFM-2"; and,
- (10) The "New Funding Modification" designation for all new grants, new matching funds, and/or new funds acquired by the Pueblo will be identified as "NF-1", "NF-2", and so on; and,
 - (11) No expenditure will be made unless included in an approved budget and/or modified budget as approved by the Council.

Please Dispose Trash Properly in appropriate bins



- Bagged Household Waste = GREEN Compactor Bin
- Recyclables = WHITE Recycle Bin
 - No glass items, No trash, No food !!
 - If you have your recyclables a plastic bag please dump items out in bin. If you need a list of what is recyclable and what is not accepted, please stop by for one.
- Metals = GREY Metal Bin
- Weeds and branches = Please dispose below the bins at the bottom of the hill. <u>Please DO NOT mix trash with</u> weeds or branches.
- We DO NOT accept OIL or TIRES

<u>Disposal of dead animals in ANY bins located at the Transfer Station is</u> **NOT ALLOWED!**

Any dead animals found in our bins will not be accepted at the Santa Fe Waste Facility and will effect the scheduling of bin pick ups. Please do not dump dead animals. Thank you!

TRIBAL LAW CODE - 19.2.1.150 RESPONSIBILITY FOR REMOVAL OF CARCASS.

An Owner is responsible for removing and appropriately disposing of all animal carcasses, no matter where the carcass is located, and all expenses associated with the removal and disposal. Burial of horses must be at a depth of no less than six (6) feet and only at a sight approved by the Solid Waste Department and that does not interfere with ground water.

Other animals need only be buried at a depth of no less than three (3) feet.

How to keep smells out of outdoor trash can



- You can use baking soda to clean your indoor and outdoor garbage can by sprinkling some on the bottom, followed by water (and a splash of white vinegar) and then scrubbing until the container is clean and odor-free
- Sprinkle a 1/2 cup of baking soda on the bottom of the bin to absorb any unpleasant odors.
- In place of baking soda, you can also use a scoop of cat litter as a deodorizer.
- Dyer sheets are another great odor absorber and can give your trash bin a fresh scent.
- Lay some old newspapers down to absorb mold- causing moisture



Our Health is most important to ourselves and to our family. Let's all work together to make little changes for the greater good for each and every one of us.



How to understand your BMI? What is BMI? Body Mass Index is a person's weight in kilograms (or pounds) divided by the square of height in meters (or feet). A high BMI can indicate high body fatness. BMI screens for weight categories that may lead to health problems, but it does not diagnose the body fatness or health of an individual.

My height and weight indicates that my BMI (Body Mass Index) says that I am overweight. I should be in the healthy weight range of between 108-145lbs. What do I do now to change that? Motivation, dedication, accountability for working out and healthy eating habits. I am challenging you to take a challenge with me to change our numbers and work together and especially to motivate each.

Also, there are a couple of exercise machines available to use here at the Senior Center/HHS office, Treadmills, Elliptical and two seated bikes. Please call ahead or text me to make sure that one of us is here and if you need any assistance.

NATIONAL SAFETY MONTH

Prevent the growth of bacteria with a clean kitchen

June marks National Safety Month and here at the San Ildefonso Health and Human Services we want to share the importance maintaining a food safe environment.

Making sure that food is safe should be our top priority. The best safety measure for preparing food is keeping your kitchen and cooking utensils clean and safe.

FOOD SAFETY

Bacteria grows between 40 -140° F and food left out on the counter can grow bacteria fast. Start by storing food at the proper temperature. The Food and Drug Administration, FDA, states the refrigerator temperature should be at or below 40° F (4° C) and the freezer should be checked to be at 0° F (-18° C). This will limit the growth of bacteria in warm climates and reduces the risk of foodborne illnesses.

The following information provided will help to keep your kitchen safe.

Refrigeration Placement

Cold spots are at the very back on the bottom shelf and the top self of the refrigerator. The middle of the door is the warmest area in the refrigerator.

Placement	Food Item/s
On the door	Butter, beverages, cooking oils, condiments (ketchup, mayonnaise)
Top Shelf	Leftovers, jam/jelly, fruit cups, yogurt, pudding
Deli Bins	Deli Meats: Bacon, hotdogs, cheese
Bottom/lowest shelf	Raw meat packages: Poultry, fish in separate containers, milk, eggs (in original containers)
Crisper Bins	High humidity: broccoli, carrots, cauliflower, leafy greens Low humidity: avocados, mushrooms, peppers, melons, squash, grapes

Refrigerate and Preserve

Foods that need refrigerated quickly:

- · Meat: Chicken, beef, pork and
- · Eggs
- Milk
- Fruit
- Vegetables



Limit Food Contamination:

- 1. Wash hands and all surfaces when cooking.
- 2. Keep produce and raw meat separate. Use separate cutting boards and kitchen equipment when working with these products.
- 3. Use a thermometer to check and cook food to correct internal temperatures.
- 4. Refrigerate perishable food and leftovers within 2 hours (in 1 hour if the temperature outside is more than 90° F).

Cooking temperature guide:

Cook foods to safe internal temperatures to kill harmful germs that cause food poisoning.

Food	Туре	Temperature
Meat	Beef, pork, lamb	160 ° F
Fresh beef	Steak, roast, chops	145 ° F
Poultry	Turkey, chicken	165 ° F
Pork	Fresh pork, fresh ham	145 ° F
Ham	Precook ham (to reheat)	165 ° F



Safety tips

- · Marinate food in the refrigerator, not on the counter
- Wipe up spills, reduce the spread of bacteria
- Cover foods in containers
- Check the expiration date




