PUEBLO DE SAN ILDEFONSO PRIMARY ELECTION

DATE: SATURDAY, OCTOBER 29, 2022

TIME: 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

POLLING PLACE: LEARNING CENTER/LIBRARY

VOTER REGISTRATION IS NOT REQUIRED. Any enrolled member of the Pueblo age eighteen (18) or older by October 29, 2022, is eligible to vote in-person at the polling place during voting hours. Absentee voting will NOT be permitted in this year's Election.

While the polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., no persons except members of the Election Commission shall be allowed to remain within fifty (50) feet of the polling place. Campaigning is not allowed within fifty (50) feet of the polling place.

Voting Safety

While we encourage everyone to exercise your right to vote, it is everyone's responsibility to take the Pueblo's public health orders and safety precautions seriously in order to protect yourself and others in your family and community from contracting the COVID-19 virus.

Masks and gloves are optional while participating in the voting process but they are encouraged. If you are in line at 7:00 p.m., you will be allowed to vote.

Ballot Instructions

Eligible Voters will be allowed the following number of votes for the Primary Election:

- Up to 10 Votes for Council Representatives
- If you mark **more** than the allowed number of votes for a position then that section of the ballot will be considered spoiled and your vote will not be counted. If you mark **less** than the number of Pueblo de San Ildefonso Election Commissioners or Council Representatives of votes you are allowed for a position, only those votes that was marked will be counted, and that section will be valid.

NO WRITE-IN CANDIDATES WILL BE ALLOWED. If you write-in a candidate for a position then that section of the ballot will be considered spoiled and your vote will not be counted.

As required by the Governing Agreement, a criminal background check has been conducted on all candidates for elective office. Legislative Update

Tribal Elections

The Primary Election to be held on Saturday, October 29, 2022 will be to elect ten (10) candidates to move on to the General Election in December at which time the candidates will be narrowed down to five (5) Council Representatives. There are currently 14 candidates running for Council Representative.

All Tribal Members including the newly eligible voters (age 18 as of October 29, 2022) are encouraged to vote for these leadership positions.

Community Meeting

The Enrollment Committee has tentatively scheduled the date of Saturday, November 5, 2022 for a meeting with the community to review the revised draft Enrollment Policies and Procedures. Participation is encouraged in this discussion as this is an important policy which affects new and existing members. An announcement with meeting details will be forthcoming.

Council Committee Updates

The **Enrollment Committee** is planning a community meeting tentatively scheduled for Saturday, November 5, 2022.

The revised draft Enrollment Policies and Procedures is available on the Pueblo's website under the "Community" tab.

Tribal Members are encouraged to read the document and provide written comments and/or recommendations.

Comments may be submitted in email or letter format to any of the Legislative Office staff.

The **Budget, Finance & Taxation Committee** is currently reviewing options for possibly establishing a Minor's Trust Fund for Tribal Members. This is only a discussion at this point but it is something that the Council feels is important to analyze in order to benefit the tribally enrolled minors for future expenses.



Random Laws

The Legislative Office will place random laws in our newsletter to 1) remind the community of what laws currently exist in the Tribal Code and 2) to surface laws that may need to be revisited, amended, updated and etc.

Chapter 25.1 Pueblo de San Ildefonso Traffic Safety Code

Part 25.1.5 Speed Violations and Restrictions

25.1.5.010 Speed Regulations

(a) No person shall drive a vehicle on a highway at a speed greater than:

(1) Fifteen (15) miles per hour on all highways when passing school zone while children are going to and leaving school and when the school zone is properly posted;

(2) Twenty-five (25) miles per hour in any business or residence district;

(3) Fifty-five (55) miles per hour on highways and open country or in other locations.

(b) In every event, speed shall be so controlled as may be necessary:

(1) To avoid colliding with any person, vehicle, conveyance on or entering the highway;

(2) To comply with legal requirements and the duty of all persons to use due care, and to drive in such manner and at such speed that he shall not endanger life, health, or property.

(3) The speed limits set forth in this section may be changed by ordinance of the Council.

25.1.5.020 Minimum Speed Regulations

No person shall drive a motor vehicle at such a slow speed as to impede or block the normal and reasonable movement of traffic except when slow speed is necessary for safe operation or in compliance with law. Tribal and police officers are hereby authorized to enforce this provision by directions to drivers, and in the vent of apparent willful disobedience to this provision and refusal to comply with direction of an officer in accordance herewith, the continued slow operation by a driver shall be a violation.



Projects

- The Gymnasium Renovation project is underway and will be completed in January 2023 (modified restrooms, improved roofing, painting)
- The “Tewa Tank” will be improved beginning in October and will be completed in December (sandblasting/cleaning/access improvements) There will be no interference with water access
- Phase 2 Wastewater project is currently out for bid; bids are due by October 12th and we anticipate construction beginning in November 2022. The South Side of the Pueblo will be connected to the main system. A construction schedule will be provided to the Community
- The HVAC system is currently being upgraded at the Senior Program
- The Comprehensive Land Use Plan will be presented at the October 20, 2022 Tribal Council Meeting for approval
- The next planning session for the new Museum and Cultural Center is scheduled for September 29th at 4:30

UPCOMING PROJECTS

- Improvements to the Tribal Administration Building (cement with shade structure)
- Roofing Projects – Senior Program, Learning Center, Head Start/Admin Building, Tewa Center, Church, Facilities Building
- Head Start Facility Improvements – Playground, Parking, and interior renovations
- Phase 3 Wastewater Project – Vigil Enterprises will begin monitoring the existing Wastewater Lagoons in October
- Irrigation – Plans are underway to install a 25HP pump on the west side and fencing will be going up at Well #60 in El Rancho and at the Head Gate

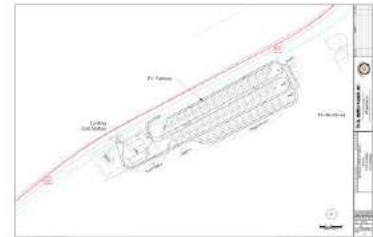

San Ildefonso Housing Authority (SIHA) proposes to apply for a 2022 Indian Community Development Block Grant (ICDBG) of up to \$2 million in the Economic Development category. The funding would help finance a 44-unit Recreational Vehicle Park on an eight-acre site adjacent to the Totavi gas station.

The park, which will take two years to develop, is envisioned to offer a range of amenities that make the park more attractive to tenants including full-service electric and water sites, men's and women's shower/restroom, laundry facilities, dump and water stations, and playground. The site will process waste using an Orenco Wastewater Treatment Processor.



SIHA, the Pueblo de San Ildefonso's full-service Tribally Designated Housing Entity, has assembled a management team with the extensive experience in planning, managing and implementing economic development projects within the past five years. During this time, the Executive Director and Deputy Director—who both have master's degrees in international economics—have \$3 million in Economic Development Administration projects including Jicarilla Apache Oil and Gas assets acquisition feasibility study, Santa Fe Community College Building Energy and Maintenance Training Center, and Questa Business Park expansion; a \$600,000 CDBG grant that funded behavioral health facility in Espanola;

Project need is driven by a workforce housing crisis at the Los Alamos National Laboratory adjacent to the Pueblo. LANL embarked on a \$13 billion construction program in 2019 that will continue for the next several years. The construction projects will generate new temporary employment totalling 10 to 15 new workers in the area.

Both rental and market-rate housing is now, essentially, completely full. There is an urgent unmet demand for temporary housing for workers at LANL. While many of the construction workers are local, some come from elsewhere and stay in temporary lodging such as RV parks. These workers stay in the area for a few weeks to several months at a time, and there is no nearby housing for them. LANL is hiring well over 1,000 new workers annually and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future. The RV Park will market to and benefit these workers. In addition, tourist visitors to Bandelier, Los Alamos and other nearby tourist attractions stay at RV parks in the area and this site would offer a newer, more proximate site for these prospective customers as well.

Cost estimates and financial projections for the project will be available at the time of the public meeting. Preliminary estimates indicate the project will cost \$1.5 million with \$1.125 million in ICDBG project financing requested and \$375,000 tentatively slated to be financed with a private bank loan. SIHA will form a for-profit subsidiary corporation to own and manage the site, which an initial feasibility study using conservative assumptions suggests will employ approximately four previously low-income individuals and contribute about \$150,000 in revenue per year to SIHA. The new program income will be utilized to supplement the tribes Indian Housing Block Grant (IHBG) funds with additional resources for low-and-moderate income housing.



HOUSING REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY

Message from the Director

The San Ildefonso Housing Authority (SIHA) has been operating for nine months. It's a privilege to serve as the first Director.

Christopher, Darien, and I are working hard making continuous improvements needed to make SIHA the Member-friendly, full-service housing authority you deserve. This progress report is a summary of what we've accomplished over the first nine months.

I'm grateful for the generous support provided by Governor, Tribal Council, Pueblo staff, SIHA staff, and especially Pueblo Members who have been so patient while we get the organization set up to serve you well. Thank you everyone.

SIHA Startup

SIHA has been built from the ground up. Starting from scratch, we've completed a long list of actions needed to administer the Pueblo's annual Indian Housing Block Grant allocation and funds from many other sources. Startup highlights include:

- Resolutions forming SIHA adopted
- Official organization documents filed
- Five-person Board convened
- Bylaws, Policies, passed by Board
- Federal authorizations obtained
- SIHA office set up for operations
- Developed strategic plan of action
- Two staff hired
- Set up bank and accounting systems
- Set up housing management system
- Secured \$4 million in funding for rehabilitation and new home projects

NM Gas Energy Efficiency Program

We're pleased to announce that SIHA has been selected as a New Mexico Gas Company Native American Energy Efficiency Program partner. The New Mexico Gas Native American Energy Efficiency Program will provide NO-COST energy efficiency services to help tribal seniors save energy and money.

We've signed up the maximum of thirty seniors 60 and above to receive these services in a first round of services through the end of the year. We've also received about 15 applications from seniors who we hope to serve with a second round of services in February of 2023. We still need about 15 applications to fill up the second round. If you're a senior over 60 who owns your home on the Pueblo and would like these services, call or e-mail Business Services Manager, Christopher Romero, at (505) 455-4162, christopher@sanihousing.org, or stop by the SIHA office to sign up for the February program.

COVID Relief Packages

SIHA has received a one-time allocation of American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds to provide COVID relief services to Pueblo Members. COVID relief packages containing supplies such as: masks; thermometers, pulse oximeters; cleaning supplies and disinfectants; sanitizers; air purifier; laundry supplies; moisturizer; and alcohol wipes will be distributed to all Pueblo households. We expect to be delivering the packages sometime in November.

Home Improvement Program

Tribal Council is considering a SIHA request to match SIHA funding dedicated to home repairs with Pueblo ARP funding for a Home Improvement Program.

If adopted, the program will make up to \$7,500 in emergency repairs available to low-income homeowners. Non-low-income Pueblo homeowners will also be eligible to receive up to \$7,500 in home repairs of their choice. However, non-low-income homebuyers will be required to match the home improvement grant on a dollar-for-dollar basis in order to qualify for participation in the program.

We will open up the program waiting list to everyone and provide more program information once the NM Energy and COVID relief Package projects are completed.

Deer Tail 2 New Housing Project

With strong support from Governor and Council, SIHA has raised \$3.5 million to fund construction of infrastructure to support 12-24 new homes in the Deer Tail neighborhood. We're now getting the design and engineering work done for that project in hopes of getting under construction shortly after the first of the New Year.

Home Conveyances Status Report

We know that as many as thirty households are waiting for conveyance of their paid-off homes. This is a very high priority in our workplan. However, it is a difficult assignment. SIHA has spent a great amount of time working with BIA to get properties leased to NPHA into SIHA ownership so that these conveyances can be completed. We can't estimate a completion time, yet. In addition, we're still looking to hire a Housing Manager

who will be responsible for completing this work. Once we find that person, their responsibility will include processing conveyances as quickly as possible. In the meantime, SIHA staff has submitted everything requested by BIA so far and we're now waiting for a reply so we can move on to the next step in the lease assumption process. Again, thanks for your patience while we work this through.

Housing Emergency Procedure

SIHA has received a large number of requests for a 24-hour, 7 days a week, emergency number to call to support Members who experience housing emergencies. We do NOT have this service available, yet.

Pueblo homeowners are reminded that while SIHA does plan to make extensive services like those described above available on a regular basis, it is homeowners responsibility, not SIHA's, to maintain your home.

While we work to develop an on-call service for Members over time, Tribal Council has asked us to publish the following list of 24-hour, 7 days a week emergency service providers that Members can call anytime in the event of a housing emergency.

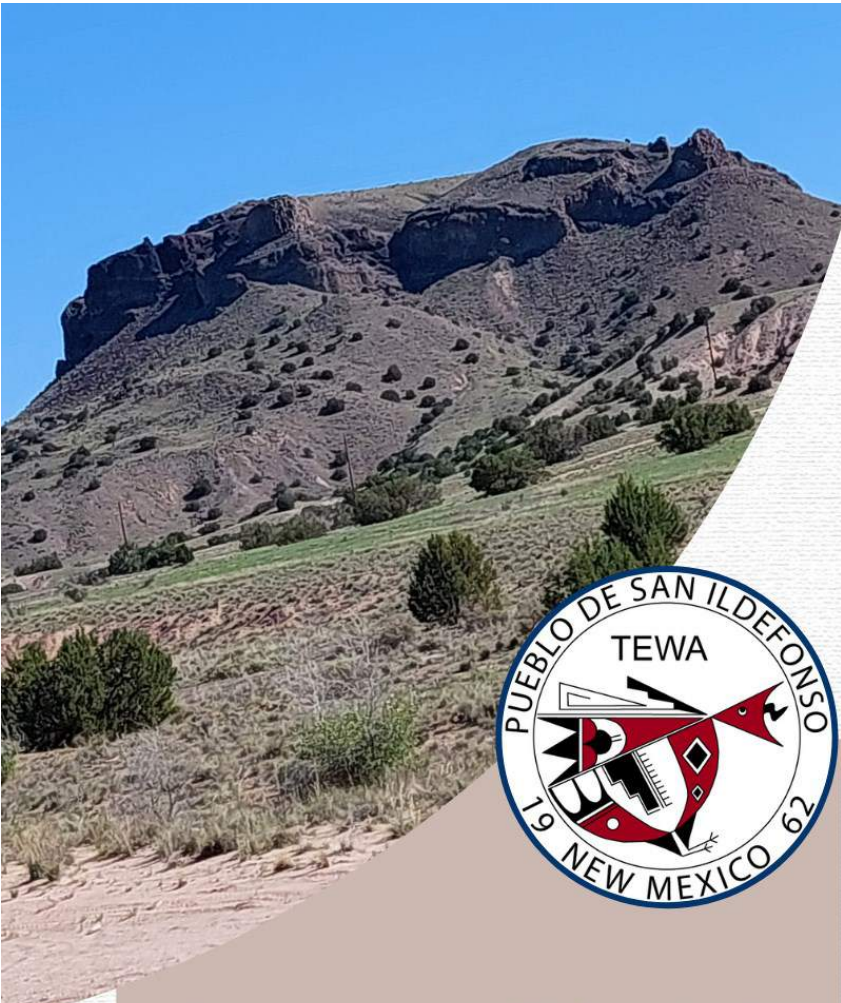

Roasted Butternut Squash & Root Vegetables

This easy roasted butternut squash and root vegetables recipe is incredibly versatile. Pile the squash and veggies onto grain bowls, add to sandwiches, toss in soup, serve as a side dish—you name it. Roasting vegetables in the oven gives you 20 minutes of hands-off cooking time to assemble the rest of your meal.

Total: 40 mins

Ingredients

- 3 cups butternut squash, peeled, seeded, and cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 cup sliced parsnips
- ½ cup sliced carrot
- ½ cup chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon ground pepper
- ¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper

Directions

Step 1

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Combine squash, parsnips, carrot, and onion in a 15-by-10-inch baking pan.

Step 2

Drizzle the vegetables with oil and sprinkle with salt, pepper, and cayenne; toss to coat.

Step 3

Roast, covered, for 20 minutes. Stir the vegetables and then roast, uncovered, until tender and starting to brown, about 10 minutes more.

“When tires go to BuRRT for recycling, they are loaded on a trailer and transported to [State Rubber](#) in Denver City, Texas. State Rubber shreds the tires and produces crumb rubber to use for other applications.

Scrap tires take up a lot of space in the landfill, causing it to fill up faster which cost everyone more money. It can also cause problems with the landfill covers due to their uneven settlement and tendency for tires to rise to the surface. “

Where to take Oil >>> Most Auto Repair shops will take they oil

Most Auto repair shops will take successfully collected oil such as AutoZone or Jiffy Lube. We encourage you to dispose of oil right away after your change to prevent from seeping into ground and **DO NOT** dispose in or near any water sources.

We understand that doing oil changes yourself can save you time and money. However, we do not have sufficient resources to collect the any oil at this time. If you need assistance with contacting a facility, please contact a Transfer Station Attendant for help.

Recycling at the Transfer Station

We ask that you please EMPTY your recyclables from your bags into the Recycling Bin and throw bag(s) in compactor. The workers at the Recycling Center cannot see what is in the bags and can be a hazard, as well. It also helps the Attendants catch any items that are not allowed in the bin.

Community Update



Posa's Express

Posa's Tamale Factory and Restaurant is in the process of preparing for the opening of Posa's Express, which will be in Totavi Tewa Market and Fuel. The restaurant will be open Monday through Friday from 6am to 6pm. Staff is currently cleaning and setting up the kitchen for an opening target of October 20, 2022.

Totavi Development

Through the Pueblo Alliance, SIS's Joint Venture with Tsay Corporation, we have funding to develop a construction yard for our LANL landscaping contract. A fence will surround the development area and additional security measures will be put into place. In addition to the yard, SIS will be starting additional projects which will include an RV Park, a Cellular Tower, and Electric Vehicle Charging Station in the areas to the east and west of Tewa Market and Fuel. Funding for the projects will come from a variety of sources. SIS is collaborating with Pueblo staff and BIA to attain proper clearances.

Solar

With our subcontractor, Avant Energy, SIS has completed 2nd phase of the study related to the Pueblo and surrounding communities' electric infrastructure. This will assist in determining the electric grid's capacity for additional electricity from any future solar project. As mentioned previously, we are working on three potential options for development, with offsetting community members electric bills as a priority. The Final phase of the Feasibility study will include discussions with both PNM and Jemez Electric on interconnection requirements and energy sales terms. It will also include final location(s) for the solar project(s). Funding sources will be identified, and a development plan will be created for the project.



We continue to seek staff, with a starting pay at \$14/hour along with a signing Bonus of \$500(after completing the 90-day probationary period). As operating expenses continue to rise, we have taken an aggressive pricing strategy with all products to offset the increase. As a result, Fuel prices are higher on average to our local market. Fuel Dispenser issues are being addressed and will be corrected shortly; we thank you for patience.

San Ildefonso Broadband

In the coming months, the FCC will be releasing a new Broadband Coverage Map. The map information comes from the providers and will show details of service and coverage provided in our Pueblo. Past FCC Broadband Maps have shown that the providers tend to overstate what is available. SIS will be conducting research in the area to verify and determine the Pueblo's access to Broadband Services. The final map will determine future funding under the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment Program (BEAD). We are still on track to receive \$4.9 million in funds for Broadband Development and are actively seeking additional funds to enhance our network and promote adoption.
