Project Management Office

Administrative Office – Portal Improvements

The concrete/flagstone and flagpoles have been removed and the Cerro Grande Fire tree has been replanted at the East end of the parking area. The dirt/earthwork was completed the end of December and the concrete is being poured the first week of January. A shade canopy will be installed in mid-February. Thank you for your patience with the closure of the main entrance. This will be a welcoming area for meetings, visitors, coffee and lunch breaks.



Pueblo-Wide Roofing Projects

ABC Roofing has been contracted to complete the projects. The Senior Center, Realty Bay, and Maintenance buildings have been completed. Roofing on the Church started in December, and completion is now postponed until after the New Year. The Learning Center and Tewa Center will be completed in January as well; and the Administration/Head Start building will be completed this spring



Relentless Roofing has been contracted to repair and re-roof the properties located on Odo Po. They are seeking Laborers for the project. If you are interested, please contact the Project Management Office

Gymnasium Renovation Project

Although difficult to see from the outside of the building, a lot of work has been completed in the interior of the building. Interior doors have been cut and the plumbers are on site completing water line insulation. Restrooms have been demoed, and electricians are working on roughing in the lighting. The first phase of interior work will be completed in January. The second phase of work which includes: window replacement, addition of a shade structure/cement seating area, and painting of the exterior of the building will be completed by the middle of June 2023



Tewa Center Renovations

HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

<u>Eligibility</u>: All on-Pueblo Households. Must be tribal member. Must be primary residence. One-to-one matching funds required.

<u>Funding Amount</u>: Each participant will receive \$1 in matching funds (up to \$7,500) for each \$1 you provide for any home improvement you wish to make.

Eligible Improvements: Any home improvement you want to make.

Residents who have paid for home repairs from July 1 through November 30, 2022 are eligible to receive one-half the documented paid amount of a project cost up to \$7,500.

EMERGENCY REPAIRS PROGRAM

Eligibility: Low-Income on-Pueblo Households only

<u>Funding Amount</u>: Each qualified family will receive up to \$7,500 in home improvements for FREE. No matching funds required.

<u>Eligible Improvements</u>: Roof repairs, electrical, plumbing, handicap accessibility, mechanical (furnace/heater, water heater, HVAC), septic system /sewer lines only.





<u>Internet</u>

The tribal program that reimburses for internet service expired on Dec 31, 2022. There is a federal program that can assist with paying internet service bills if you qualify. It's from the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) and it's called the Affordable Connectivity Program.

Why Recycle? From Roberta Trujillo, Transfer Station

Recycling is critical to our efforts to conserve the earth's natural resources. Recycling also reduces litter and the costs of solid waste disposal.

This Acoma Pueblo pot tells an ancient story of recycling. Pueblo Indian women crafted clay pots that lasted for years of use. When the pots eventually broke, they were not thrown into a dump. The broken pots were crushed down to a fine clay

powder. The powder was then soaked to soften it to a workable clay consistency. This recovered clay was used to make strong and beautiful new pots.

Today, we use many materials once, and then consider them waste. Like broken pots, these materials are actually precious resources. We are all learning that we cannot afford to continue throwing away resources in our garbage cans. Our task now is to develop again the age-old art of recycling.

Recycling is defined as the collecting, manufacturing, and selling/buying of new products made from what once was thought of as waste. The recycling symbol of chasing arrows on the cover represents the three components necessary to make a difference through recycling.

2023 NATIONAL SEED SWAP DAY LAST SATURDAY IN JANUARY

National Seed Swap Day on the last Saturday in January serves as a reminder to gardeners that spring is on its way. It is also an ideal time for gardeners to gather and swap seeds in preparation for starting seeds indoors.

The seed swap is a fundamental part of human history. Seeds were one of the first commodities valued and traded. Today, modern gardeners collect and exchange seeds for many reasons ranging from cultivating rare, heirloom varieties to basic thrift. The exchange of seeds perpetuates biodiversity, too. It is an act of giving and the ultimate form of recycling.

- Exchange seeds with friends, attend a local seed swap, or help organize one.
- Post your events online so they are easily found using #Seed Swap Day
- Experienced gardeners offer seed collection, labeling, and preservation tips.
- Generate interest in your seed swaps. Plan urban gardens or community gardens. Not only do they improve the look of your community but they also provide nutritious food, too.
- Offer classes for starting seeds indoors and successful transplanting.
- Be sure to include children. They love to garden!
- Attend local events and show your support by volunteering.

Histor

OTOWI PAST AND PRESENT By Darryl Martinez, Water Quality Technician

THE NAME OTOWI COMES FROM the Tewa word *po'tsuwi'i* meaning "gap where water sinks." It is an appropriately descriptive name for the area, located along the Rio Grande at the head of White Rock Canyon. In 1886, a station and bridge were built here for the Chili Line, a narrow-gauge railroad that ran from Antonito, Colorado to Santa Fe.



In 1923, a post office was built here to serve the Los Alamos Ranch School. In 1928, Edith Warner, a former schoolteacher, was hired to manage the station. She came looking for solitude, but her little station soon became a gathering place for visitors near and far. Edith became friendly both with the inhabitants of the Ranch school (especially the founder's daughter, Peggy Pond) and the local San Ildefonso tribe. She also opened a small shop, restaurant, and tea room that welcomed everyone.

Just as soon as the Chili Line closed in 1941, Otowi became another kind of bridge—one between the old world of Native Americans and ranchers and the new world of the Atomic Age. When the Manhattan Project came to Los Alamos, the house at Otowi Bridge became a frequent destination for nuclear physicists.

J. Robert Oppenheimer, the father of the atomic bomb himself, kept a standing reservation at the restaurant for whenever he wanted to dine. In particular, Edith's chocolate cake became a local favorite. The relationship between the scientific laboratory, Edith Warner, and the Pueblo people is told in Peggy Pond Church's novel, *The House at Otowi Bridge*. Edith died in 1951, and was buried in the traditional Pueblo way, with no markers except broken pottery shards. Her home, too, rests on Pueblo land, now unmarked and unnoticed as time and traffic pass it by.







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
2022 PRECIPITATION: GOOD BUT NOT GREAT

2022 was a good year for precipitation, but not a great year like many had predicted. With a strong monsoon we were receiving above average precipitation for most of the year but a dry fall and start of Winter has brought us in line with hitting average this year. A strong La Niña occurring this year pushed the jet stream to higher latitudes and contributed to higher precipitation further North and a drier Winter here.

DECP is concerned with tracking climate change and addressing how we can best adapt to changing conditions. The map shows the average precipitation values in bands ranging from 10 inches annually in the dark red band to about 30 inches in the dark blue. San I averages between 10 and 16 inches annually in the form of rain and snow.



According to the USDA's SNOTEL precipitation report (<u>https://wcc.sc.egov.usda.gov/reports/UpdateReport.html</u> <u>rport=New+Mexico&format=SNOTEL+Precipitation+Update+Report</u>) the Upper Rio Grande Basin is at 97 percent of median precipitation for the year. If the current trend keeps up we will end up falling just short of average. So, here's hoping that we get some more snowy days before the year is out.

Despite reaching close to average, this year is representative of aridification occurring across the Southwest. According to an NRCS report (<u>https://statesummaries.ncics.org/chapter/nm/</u>) we are seeing less precipitation and more warm days annually.

2020 was the worst year in recent record for precipitation and high temperatures with 2021 improving on that slightly. It is reassuring to see 2022 get closer to average, at least, but we do know that dry years are sure to come in the future. Water security and climate adaptation are important things to keep in mind going forward. A good tool for keeping track of meteorological phenomena next year is the website <u>www.windy.com</u> which shows current conditions and many other interesting variables.

JMPING IN PUEBLO DE SAN ILDEFONSO

It is a violation (see Law & order Code on right) to dispose of any waste in any area other that the designated Transfer Station. If you see illegal dumping please report to the DECP, Natural Resources Office or any of the Tribal Ranger. There have already been citations issued and will be continuing enforcement to anyone who is in violation of illegal dumping on the Pueblo.

The Transfer Station posts hours of operation and closures monthly. Notices of closures will be posted on bulletin sign at Transfer Station and through community call listings for short notice closures. We have made changes to the schedule to allow more days open. We continue to evaluate hours & schedules that works best with available staff. We ask you respect the holiday hours and closures as these are allowed to the staff, per our Employee policy.

The Transfer Station accepts all household waste, recyclables, metals, green waste (trees & branches), small and large furniture, mattresses and most general items. We DO NOT accept TIRES & OIL. However, if we can not accept your items, we will do our best to help you find an alternate place to dispose them.

Title 24 PROPERTY Chapter 24.1 Zoning Part 24.1.1 Zoning and Planning, Building Permits, and Miscellaneous 24.1.1.030 Miscellaneous Provisions

(g) ADDENDUM Littering AND Illegal Dumping.

Any person(s) who shall dispose of any garbage or other forms of litter or waste anywhere within the exterior boundaries of the Pueblo of San Ildefonso, including waterways, roadpublic ways, roads, campgrounds or other public places, except in public waste disposal grounds designated by the San Ildefonso Tribal Council shall be guilty of a violation and, upon conviction thereof, may by subject to pay penalty assessment of a minimum of \$500.00 and a maximum of \$1,000.00, with costs, or to such other orders of the Court, and may be required to clean

Position: Rangeland Technician Pueblo de San Ildefonso - Santa Fe, NM

Job Summary: This position is a temporary position (5 weeks) working alongside the Natural Resource Department Staff and Contractors in conducting a Hazardous Fuel Reduction Project along the Rio Grande Bosque. The Rangeland Technician will conduct fuel reduction projects through the treatment and removal of invasive species along the Rio Grande Bosque.

TYPICAL DUTIES:

Under the supervision of the Natural Resources Director, the Rangeland Technician will participate in project activities that include:

- Job Hazard Analysis-Safety tail-gate sessions
- Training on invasive plant management, vegetation identification, monitoring, and reporting.
