I hereby agree to accept all risks of adverse public notice that may result from use of information obtained in connection with this criminal background investigation. I hereby agree to indemnify and hold harmless

any person to whom this is lawfully presented and his agent and employees from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including reasonable attorney fees, arising out or by reason of complying with this request.

By signing below, I hereby acknowledge that I will be required to complete and sign an electronic email verification sent to me by FIRST CHOICE BACKGROUND within 2 days of receiving FIRST CHOICE'S email to authorize the release of my investigative information. NOTICE

PUEBLO DE SAN ILDEFONSO ABSENTEE VOTING

The Election Law was recently amended on July 28, 2023 and approved through Council Resolution No. SI-R23-011 to allow the Election Commission to implement Absentee Voting for enrolled tribal members who meet certain criteria. The Election Commission will be implementing the Absentee Voting process during this year's tribal elections which take place beginning with the Primary on October 28th and the General on December 1st.

ABSENTEE VOTING ELIGIBILITY. Any enrolled member of the Pueblo age eighteen (18) or older by October 28, 2023 and by December 1, 2023, who are Out-of-State College students or active in the military. This is also available for homebound seniors who are physically unable to vote at the polling place.

ABSENTEE BALLOT REQUESTS. Any enrolled member who meets the criteria described above may submit a request form (attached) to the Election Commission to receive an absentee ballot for the Primary and General Elections. Requests can be received beginning September 12, 2023.

DEADLINE TO SUBMIT. Requests for absentee ballots must be submitted on the 15th day before the Primary and General Elections. Forms can be mailed, hand-delivered to any commissioner, or e-mailed to ec@sanipueblo.org

Deadline for Primary is by October 13, 2023 by 4:30 p.m. Deadline for General is November 16, 2023 by 4:30 p.m.





How to Reduce, Reuse & Recycle at San Ildefonso Pueblo

Everyone has heard the, "Reduce, Reuse, Recycle," slogan for many years. What does it really mean though? This waste management hierarchy is meant to guide residents to better understand how to be conscious consumers and to better care for our environment. When properly followed, "Reduce, Reuse, Recycle," helps us to use less resources and to manage our materials more sustainably.

Reduce is the first step in sustainable materials management. Reduce means to not create the waste or toxins in the first place. It is a form of source reduction or pollution prevention. This is easily transferred into our daily lives. A few simple ways for Pueblo residents to "reduce" include the following:

- Use reusable household items, instead of disposable items. This means using reusable, hard plastic or ceramic dishes instead of disposable items like paper or Styrofoam plates.
- Use non-toxic, alternative cleaning products. Conventional cleaning products often contain a large number of potentially harmful chemicals that are volatile, which means that without any prompting, they evaporate from a liquid to a gas when they're exposed to air. These volatile organic compounds, or VOCs, can do significant damage to the human body and the environment. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) cites studies that show VOC levels in the average home are up to five times higher than outside, in large part due to the chemical cleaners we use around the house. A great resource to make your own non-toxic cleaners that really work can be found HERE.
- Think about each purchase you make. Do you really need that item? When you are purchasing an item, think about how long it will last and work for you. If it looks like it is made to enjoy for just a few minutes and then made for the landfill, don't buy it!
- Consider sharing larger items like tools with family and friends. Not everyone needs their own leaf blower or chainsaw when it's easy to share these items with each other.

Reuse is next in the waste management hierarchy. Every time we hand down clothes that no longer fit us or take usable items to the thrift store, that is reusing! Reuse can also help save money. The average used item is more than 500% less expensive than the same item sold new.

Other ways to reuse include repurposing items around the house. The broken wheelbarrow can become a great flower box or torn t-shirts can be cut up into cleaning rags.

That leads us to the final "R" in the slogan: Recycle. Recycling is an important tool in the sustainable waste management toolbox, but remember it comes AFTER reduce, and reuse. Recycling does save natural resources and energy! Recycling items like aluminum cans saves 92% of the energy that is required to produce cans from new aluminum. Also, aluminum is considered a sustainable material, which means it can be recycled again and again with no loss of material.

Recently the New Mexico Recycling Coalition oversaw a waste audit at San Felipe Pueblo. An audit team consisting of Pueblo staff and staff from the New Mexico Recycling Coalition, physically sorted through over 475 pounds of the Pueblo's residential solid waste and recycling to better understand the categories of material are in the trash. The trash was sorted into nine categories: non-recyclable trash, food waste, mixed paper, tin cans, glass, chipboard/corrugated cardboard, plastic #1 bottles, plastic #2 bottles, and aluminum cans. Figure 1 shows the results of this study.

Based on the waste audit, the Pueblo's recycling rate was 5.5% and the amount of material that was in the trash that could be recycled with EXISTING recycling programs at San Ildefonso Pueblo was 20.3%. Pueblo residents can separate their household recyclables, like aluminum cans, cardboard and plastic milk and soda bottles, from their household trash and drop them off into the labeled recycling bins at the San Ildefonso transfer station.

Recycling is available for Pueblo residents and collected at the San Ildefonso Transfer Station. Accepted recyclables include mixed recyclables consisting of aluminum, plastics #1 and #2 bottles (soda and water bottles, milk jugs, laundry detergent & shampoo bottles, etc), tin cans, mixed paper, cardboard, and glass. Glass is accepted separate from other household recyclables.

This summer at Santiago Day celebrations in late July, the Pueblo's solid waste staff lead waste sort/recycling education activities in which residents had to decide which items belonged in the trash and which items belonged in the recycling. Roberta Trujillo, the Pueblo's Transfer Station Operator, helped create the game and snuck in some harder items that made people think.

For example, everyone knew that aluminum cans go in the recycling bin, but what about the cat food bag? Trujillo asked participants if the cat food bag was recyclable. The answer: no! The cat food bag looked like paper, but if you looked more closely it had a plastic coating on it.

Another tricky item was plastic utensils like forks and spoons. Many participants thought, "yes plastic is recyclable so put that in the recycling bin." The answer whether plastic forks and spoons are recyclable is actually, "No!" Plastic utensils aren't recyclable for a few reasons 1. They often have food debris on them. Anything with food debris on it is trash. The food residue can contaminate recyclables so they lose their value; 2. They are small and slip through the cracks of the sorting machinery. A good rule of thumb is to only recycle things that are the size of your fist or larger; and 3. The plastic resin that is used to make plastic utensils has very little or zero value at end-markets. The best thing to do is to remember the beginning of this article, and REDUCE by not using disposable utensils in the first place!



And don't forget there are other "R"s that we can use to help lessen our burden on the land. These include repair (fix items instead of tossing them!), rot (turn old food scraps and yard debris into valuable compost for your garden), rethink (think about new ways to reduce our waste and save natural resources).

Images below show the San Ildefonso Pueblo waste audit. All recyclable items identified within the trash during the waste sort were recycled following the audit.







HOUSING APPLICATIONS

SIHA has received 30 applications for the Waiting List for the current Deer Tail Phase II subdivision. Most of these applicants will be referred to Homewise in Santa Fe, NM for financial literacy in preparation of mortgages. Applications are still being accepted. Include applications can be filled out on line or pick up from SIHA

If you need assistance in filling out the application or have questions you may contact Devan Martinez, Housing Manager at the SIHA Office.

Deer Tail Phase II

Deer Tail infrastructure contractor RFP has been distributed with a deadline of proposal submission by September 1st, if SIHA doesn't receive at least 2 proposals advertisements will have to go out a second time. The Deer Tail Phase II is planned for 27 homesites.

Quitclaim Deeds and Conveyance's

Ms. Carolyn Abeita, Legal Counsel submitted a letter to Superintendent McKenna to proceed with the Land Assumptions so Quit Claims may be processed, as of date SIHA hasn't received a response.

SIHA received a \$45,000.00 grant from Enterprise Foundation and \$50,000.00 from Wells Fargo Invest Native. The grants will be utilized for capacity building for staff and Board members, replacing the accounting software with MIP and assistance to get SIHA finances set up in the system.

SIHA will apply for the 2023 Indian Community Development Block Grant in the amount of \$2 million for Homeownership Assistance on the Deer Tail Phase II homes, this will ensure the homes are affordable to the San Ildefonso Tribal Members.

Relentless Roofing has been working on roof repairs through the Emergency Repair Program, as of date they have completed 12 roofs and have 2 remaining. Relentless is also working on homes under the Home Improvement Program, as information this program was changed to 60/40 (SIHA pays 60% not to exceed \$9,000.00 and homeowner pays 40%). **Applications are still being accepted** and can be obtained on the SIHA website at sanihousing.org.

Under the BIA ARPA funding SIHA purchased and delivered 60 air conditioners and completed 4 handicap accessibility bathrooms and/or ramps. This program is **closed**.
