The Agreement sets the qualifications to run for the open seat as follows:

Council Representative:

Member of the Pueblo at least 25 years old (A person who “wins” a Council Representative seat must establish residency within the exterior boundaries of the Pueblo immediately).

Nominations for Office

Any qualified person wishing to run for office must complete a Candidate Nomination and Criminal background form. You may pick up forms from any of the Election Commissioners' or at the Governor's Office.

Please Note: As required by the governance Agreement, a criminal background check will be conducted on all candidates for elective office, and the results of the background checks will be made available to any member of the Pueblo upon request.

DEADLINE TO FILE A CANDIDATE NOMINATION FORM AT THE ELECTION COMMISSION OFFICE: January 8, 2024 by 4:30 p.m.

After the candidate nomination deadline, the Election Commission will post a final list of candidates by January 12, 2024.

Voting Age

Any Member of the Pueblo age 18 or older, as of January 28, 2024 will be permitted to vote in-person at the polling place during voting hours. Absentee voting **will not** be permitted in this Special Election due to the short time-frame and unforeseen circumstance.

Once a candidate is sworn in as a Representative, the Representative shall have thirty days to establish residency within the exterior boundaries of the Pueblo as defined at the time of the adoption of this Agreement.

Certification of Candidate Qualifications

By signing below, I hereby certify that I meet the qualifications for elective office, and that upon election to office, I will follow the requirements for office including any requirement to establish my residency within the exterior boundaries of the Pueblo.

Under the Amended Election Law: Article III – Nominations; Section 1. Nominations, A Self – Nomination, 1. Any qualified member of the pueblo may submit his or her name in writing to the Election Commission as a candidate for elective office, along with a non-refundable fee of \$25.00.

Consent to a Criminal Background Check

By signing below, I hereby give my permission to the Pueblo de San Ildefonso Election Commission and its agents and representatives to conduct a criminal background check on me and to make the results of such background check available to any Member of the Pueblo upon request. I hereby authorize the custodians and their representatives of records and sources of information, including any Tribal Court records, to furnish the information to the Pueblo de San Ildefonso Election Commission and/or its agents and representatives with the information requested in the process of a background check. I understand that the background investigation will include criminal record history, whether or not such information would otherwise be protected from disclosure by any constitutional, statutory or common law privilege.

I hereby agree to accept all risks of adverse public notice that may result from use of information obtained in connection with this criminal background investigation. I hereby agree to indemnify and hold harmless any person to whom this is lawfully presented and his agent and employees from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including reasonable attorney fees, arising out or by reason of complying with this request.

By signing below, I hereby acknowledge that I will be required to complete and sign an electronic email verification sent to me by **FIRST CHOICE BACKGROUND** within **2 days** of receiving **FIRST CHOICE'S** email to authorize the release of my investigative information. OVERVIEW

1. Summary of Responsibilities

*Under restructured Articles of Organization, the **Pueblo de San Ildefonso Council and Governor** are each seeking a **Member's Representative** to serve in a professional capacity to provide leadership experience stemming from business, government, private or nonprofit sector work. Key in a **Member's Representative** is also a commitment to, and understanding of, the needs of the Pueblo community, Pueblo sovereignty and laws of the Pueblo.*

*The **Member's Representative** provides general oversight and monitoring of SIS LLC on behalf of the Pueblo de San Ildefonso, who is the sole Member of the LLC. The **Member's Representative** shall act in accordance with the authority and responsibilities set forth in the SIS Articles of Organization. The **Member's Representative** shall monitor the LLC as an asset of the Pueblo and shall act in the best interests of the Pueblo in fulfilling responsibilities. The **Member's Representative** does not exercise day-to-day management of, or control over, SIS or its business activities. The **Member's Representative** shall serve as the primary point of contact between the LLC and the Member and shall facilitate communications between the two. The **Members' Representative** shall receive compensation at the sole discretion of the Tribal Council in accordance with tribal law.*

A detailed Position Description is available. The Position Description identifies the Job Summary; Appointment, Supervision and Removal; Essential Functions; and Minimum Qualifications.

JOB SUMMARY

The Member's Representative provides general oversight and monitoring of San Ildefonso Services, LLC (SIS) on behalf of the Pueblo de San Ildefonso, who is the sole Member of the LLC. The Member's Representative shall act in accordance with the authority and responsibilities set forth in the SIS Articles of Organization. The Member's Representative shall monitor the LLC as an asset of the Pueblo and shall act in the best interests of the Pueblo in fulfilling his/her responsibilities. The Member's Representative does not exercise day-to-day management of or control over SIS or its business activities.

The Member's Representative shall serve as the primary point of contact between the LLC and the Member and shall facilitate communications between the two.

The Member's Representative shall receive compensation at the sole discretion of the Tribal Council in accordance with tribal law.

APPOINTMENT, SUPERVISION AND REMOVAL

The Member's Representative is appointed pursuant to the process set forth in the SIS Articles of Organization. The Member's Representative is subject to the supervision of the Tribal Council and Governor. The Member's Representative is subject to removal by the Tribal Council or the Governor pursuant to the process set forth in the SIS Articles of Organization.

ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

The Member's Representative's oversight and monitoring duties include, but are not limited to, providing assistance with SIS's planning, policy development and proposed legislative initiatives, and overseeing SIS's budgets, business plans, feasibility studies, and marketing studies.

A meeting of the Member's Representatives will be held annually, on the second Tuesday in June, or as otherwise scheduled by the Member's Representatives, for the purpose of electing the Manager of SIS; approving SIS's annual business plan and budget; and transacting any business that may come before the Member's Representatives at such annual meeting.

The Member's Representatives will meet with the SIS Manager no less frequently than on a quarterly basis to receive reports on, including but not limited to, SIS's financial and operating condition. Additionally, on an annual basis, the Member's Representative will receive reports from SIS Manager concerning the preceding year's financial statement and the upcoming year's financial forecast. The Member's Representative will promptly submit all such reports to the Tribal Council and Governor.



MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

Each person appointed as a Member's Representative shall possess a level of professional experience and expertise necessary to carry out the requisite duties of a Member's Representative and contribute to the ability of SIS to achieve its purpose.

A Member's Representative shall possess the following qualifications:

1. Extensive professional and leadership experience in business, government, or the nonprofit sector;
2. A commitment to and understanding of the needs of the Pueblo community, Pueblo sovereignty, and the laws of the Pueblo;
3. Integrity, credibility, and a passion for the Pueblo's economic development activities;
4. Demonstrated ability to oversee a business for maximum profitability and performance, including fiscal goals and priorities, and operational procedures and guidelines;
5. A High School Diploma is required;
6. A Bachelor's Degree in business administration, marketing, retail management, finance, or a related degree is preferred;
7. Five plus years of experience in business, finance, government, and/or related management experience is preferred;
8. A combination of education and experience may be considered in meeting the requirements of numbers 6 and 7 above;
9. Must pass a background check and successfully complete an alcohol and drug test prior to appointment; and remain subject random drug testing throughout term;
10. Must have the ability to obtain special clearances and background investigations (per project requirement basis);
11. No person who has been convicted of a felony within the last five (5) years shall be appointed as a Member's Representative. A felony is a crime punishable by at least one (1) year in jail, regardless of whether the person actually served a full year in jail; and
12. No person who has ever been convicted of a crime involving theft or conversion of money or property shall be appointed as a Member's Representative.

Pueblo Sewer Expansion Project

Project Task Description: Expansion of the sewer lines in the Shumaa Po and Than Povi Po. Work includes the installation of sewer lines and manholes in and around the residences of Shumaa Po. This also includes TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURES for Shumaa Po and Than Povi Po.

Project Schedule (subject to change):

Work on the project will be through July 17, 2024. A tentative schedule for the upcoming weeks work includes:

- On Tuesday, December 26, 2023, CF Padilla mobilized their equipment in the area of Than Povi Po to install sewer lines and manholes.
- Work will continue through January 5, 2024, as crews work eastward.

During construction, there will be disturbance to residents' driveways and yards. CF Padilla will ensure there is access to and from homes for residents. **On the day proposed scheduled work, sewer repairs will be occurring near individual homes, and the Pueblo asks the residents to limit driving in these areas of road closures during the hours of 8 AM to 6 PM.** Project Representatives will make every effort to notify residents the day before work is to commence. Times may vary, and the project representatives will communicate with individuals in the affected areas as the work progresses.

Once CF Padilla is complete with the work for the day, they will restore the site to ensure access is returned. Because of winter weather, the roads may become disturbed from storms and routine access. We ask for your patience while these roads are maintained and improved. All roads will be restored to original condition or better before the end of the project.

New Enrollment

- Enrollment Packets can be picked up at the Tribal Admin Building or they can be found on the sanipueblo.org. Go to Programs- Tribal Services- Enrollment.
- Please allow us time to process enrollment packets. Once a decision has been made, you will receive a call from our office informing you of the status of the application.
- Current requirements to be eligible for enrollment:
 - At least one parent must be enrolled with San Ildefonso Pueblo.
 - Applicant must be at least ¼ Indian Blood.
 - Cannot be enrolled in another Tribe. If you are, you must show proof of relinquishment from current enrolled tribe.

Tribal ID's

- Made by appointment. Availability is Monday thru Friday 8:30 am-12 pm and 1 pm-4:30pm. Please use contact information below to schedule.
- ID's for anyone under the age of 18 are free.
- If you are renewing your ID that has expired or is about to expire (within a month before expiration date), there will be a \$5 charge.
- If you are replacing an ID that is **not** expired (or earlier than a month before expiration date), there will be a \$10 charge. Dates of when IDs are made are shown on software.
- Cash or checks will be accepted.

IHS – PURCHASED / REFERRED CARE (PRC)

What is PRC?

The Purchased/Referred Care (PRC) Program (*Formerly known as Contract Health Services*) at IHS is for medical and dental care provided away from an IHS or tribal health care facility. PRC is not an entitlement program and IHS medical referrals does not mean the care will be paid for. All eligibility requirements must be met and approved before payment can be made on your behalf.

Eligibility Requirements

1. Person (s) must be enrolled in a Federally recognized tribe.
2. Person (s) must reside on or near the reservation in which they are enrolled.
(For San Ildefonso it will be Santa Fe, Rio Arriba and Los Alamos County's)
3. Person (s) must obtain prior authorization before receiving g medical or dental care outside of IHS.
4. Person (s) must report emergency room or urgent care visits to PRC within **72 hours** of visit. The elderly and disabled have **30 days** to report to PRC.
5. Person (s) must make a good faith effort to apply for insurance, for example; Medicaid, Medicare and Private Insurance. **Note: PRC IS PAYOR OF LAST RESORT..**

Are you receiving medical bills? Here is what you need to do.

Patient Responsibility

1. Report emergency room or urgent care visits to PRC within 72 hours of visit. The elderly and disabled have 30 days to report to PRC.

2. Present your insurance card (s) at every hospital/physician visit.
3. If you receive a bill, **immediately** call the number on the bill and give your insurance information to the facility and also give a copy of your bill to the PRC Department.

Dear San Ildefonso Pueblo community,

This notice is to inform you all about the issues that IHS-Purchased/Referred Care (PRC) is having with Los Alamos Medical Center and the Emergency Medical Associates.

Unfortunately Los Alamos Emergency Medical Associates has outsourced their billing to a company out of state/country.

The problems are:

1. They are hard to reach by phone. If contact is made, they barely speak English and/or they do not understand English well.
2. They do not understand how IHS-PRC billing works. PRC staff have continuously tried to contact these folks and get information but have failed many times.
3. Majority of the time, the Emergency Medical Associates never receive your insurance information from the hospital so that is why they bill you directly.
4. Lastly, many of you are ending up in collections and your credit is being affected.

It is your choice on the hospital you want to go to in time of need or an emergency. We cannot tell you not to go to Los Alamos for care but we feel you should know what to expect if you continue to use their facility.

SEAT AT THE TABLE and OUTREACH *Continued*....

DECP staff Director, Raymond Martinez, and Programs Manager, Erin Martinez, along with Governor Moquino and Tribal Councilwoman Denise Moquino attended the STGWG Fall meeting in November. Nine Tribes were in attendance to express their concerns about the issues the Department of Energy (DOE) facilities that are within or neighboring their boundaries causes for their culture, health, scared sites, education and protection of the land. The DOE facilities are ongoing issues due to the management, cleanup and disposal of radioactive and hazardous chemical waste at these sites. All Tribes have different concerns and are advocating to be apart and hold a “seat at the table” of DOE’s strategies for cleanup and disposal at these facilities.

This was the first time attending and participating in the meeting and it was informational at the top tier. Many of the attendees have dedicated their professional lives to the Environmental field with the US. Department of Energy (DOE), State & Tribal Environmental Departments, and State & Tribal Natural Resources Departments. Jokes were made on the number of acronyms listed and how hard it can be to keep up with. We were literally given a whole cheat sheet for reference.

A few of the take aways I received from this experience is representation through involvement and education.

Each session and each meeting had one key factor that each Tribe expressed, which was, they wanted a “Seat at the Table”. What does that mean? Tribes affected by DOE facilities (such as Los Alamos National Laboratory) want to be involved in the discussions of clean up, land and facility management. They deserve to be at the table during these major decision-making meetings and the progress of cleanups, rather than receiving second-hand information.

Why is it important? The Tribes represented at this meeting sit alongside, downhill, downwind, downstream or through a major DOE facility. Tribes need to be involved to help these agencies understand how we need to protect the lands for our culture and most importantly for the health of our people. Because once these facilities are evacuated, no longer in use or considered “complete” by DOE standards, what will be left? What will take their place or how much of that land will be restored? These are questions that are continually brought up by many Tribes. Tribes need to advocate how we can benefit from Cleanup to Energy initiatives or Remediation projects that can create more jobs or possibly the return of land.

To do this, Tribes are given their own working group session to discuss top core issues to present to DOE and other agency representatives. These issues were presented to Senior Official, Jeff Avery, Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary, DOE-EM. Governor Moquino advocated for access to tribal lands/scared sites, communication with LANL and DOE, land acknowledgment, STEM outreach, and up to date cleanup reporting. Tribal Councilwoman Moquino also advocated on the outreach and the importance representation through youth and encourage those in attendance to step out of their comfort zone, to speak up and share their experience to others when they return.

This was the first year the meeting had Tribal youth representation. Seven youth and young adults from Jemez Pueblo, Yakima Tribe and Nez Perce were in attendance. They pretty much stole the show and impressed many Representatives just by

DOE Office of Environmental Management (EM) recently completed a set of projections looking at workforce needs at cleanup sites. The analysis will help EM shape potential new development efforts & refine existing programs.

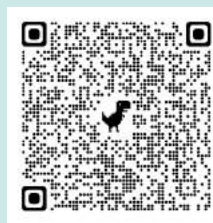
Over the next five years, EM sites are projected to need approximately:

- 11,000 operators
- 8,700 radiological technicians
- 6,500 electricians
- 5,500 project controls analysts
- 3,500 project managers
- 3,500 mechanics and
- 2,300 work planners.

With EM's cleanup mission set to last for decades, we are taking steps to ensure the next generation of workers is ready and available.

“Developing, recruiting and retaining the next-generation workforce EM will need across the country will be critical to ensuring our continued progress,” EM Senior Advisor William “Ike” White said.

showing up and being involved. Many encouraged them to continue to represent their Tribe and continue their education in the environmental field.

The representation of the youth opened the discussion throughout the meetings on how important it is to advocate education through Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (S.T.E.M) and the Environmental field. Many Tribal Representatives have a long history in STGWG and have been involved for many years, leaving them to wonder who will be there to take over and speak on their Tribes' behalf when they are gone. For that reason, we encourage youth and young adults to take an interest in getting your education in any of the S.T.E.M fields. As I mentioned, these meetings are well informed by many professionals of a higher degree. If we want Tribal representation at the table, we need to be prepared with as much dedication and education as the professionals at DOE. There are many opportunities you can advocate for your Tribe through Tribal, State, Federal, or National agencies.

Many young adults learning within their Tribes have a foot in the door and I encourage those to apply for Tribal vacant positions. DECP's own Environmental Director, Raymond Martinez, is a Co-convenor for the STGWG meetings. Raymond helps manage the Tribal and State working groups meetings and assist Tribes to relay their important information and bring issues to the table to make them the talking points for DOE Officials to listen to. DECP has also offered internships for HS students within the past two years. Our Environmental Field Assistant, Thomas Martinez, completed the free Environmental Technician Training program at Santa Fe Community College. Working with your Tribe can be a great opportunity to learn and continue your education. It's also an opportunity to learn how your Tribal government works and operates. It can lead to you to opportunities to further your education as well as being able to represent your Tribe at meetings such as STGWG.

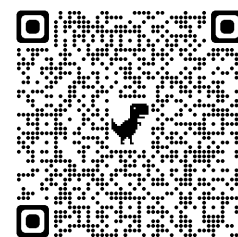

Transfer Station Recycling Efforts in 2023

The recycling efforts at the Transfer Station have been ongoing since Roberta established her first recycling challenge for Earth Day in April 2018. Since then, the Transfer Station has focused on educating our community members on how to properly recycle, reuse and reduce. Here are some of the ways we have encouraged recycling throughout our community this year.

- Spring Recycling Challenges
- National Can Kids Recycling Challenges
- Santiago Day Recycling Information booth and Recycle Bin distribution
- World Environmental Health Day Lunch Session with staff and Desk Recycle Bin distribution
- Placement of Centralized Recycling bins in main offices and high traffic buildings
- Halloween Health Fair Recycling Game
- Winter Recycling Challenge
- Recycling Education Session with the youth
- 2nd Waste Audit to identify what recyclables to focus on June & September
- Continued outreach within the monthly bulletin



Many of the challenges have awesome prizes and we encourage everyone to sign up and participate. The purpose of these challenges is to encourage everyone to recycle and to gain a routine to continue recycling.



Transfer Station Recycling Efforts in 2023 *Continued...*

Recycling is a change in lifestyle. We are used to just throwing our waste in one bin. We are now encouraging you to SEPARATE and RECOGNIZE what is and is not recyclable. It does require work; however, it becomes easy once you get hang of it and becomes a daily routine. Once you have established recycling into your daily life, you will notice that recycling reduces the amount of waste in your everyday bin. Many items that are recyclable are aluminum coke cans, plastic drink bottles, aluminum food cans, newspapers, magazines, cardboard boxes, cereal and snack boxes, and laundry plastic bottles.

In September, we completed our 2nd waste audit with NM Recycling Coalition, Sara Pierpoint, to see how our efforts to reduce waste and our recycling outreach. Waste audits help determine how we are disposing of our waste and what type of waste can be diverted to recycling. Our first audit in June 2022 showed we have very little cardboard in our waste bins, which means we are doing well to make sure everyone places all cardboard boxes into the white recycling bin. However, we did not do so well in the aluminum can and plastic bottles areas, so many community members did not recycle these items. We also had a lot of food waste and a significant amount of plastic shopping packaging/bags, Styrofoam take out and plastic food containers. The waste audit gave us areas to focus on and how we establish our recycling goals.



Figure 1. San Ildefonso Pueblo Waste Characterization of All Materials Generated SEPTEMBER 2023

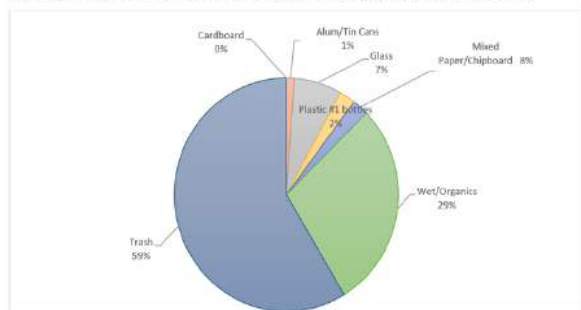
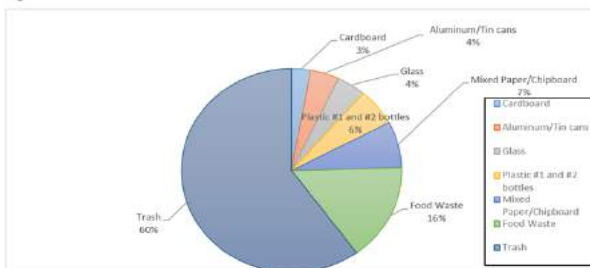


Figure 2 shows the overall waste characterization for all discards (recycled and landfilled) produced at the facility by weight in June of 2023.

Since the audit, we have increased our outreach efforts and are being proactive in helping the community understand recycling. Roberta Trujillo, Transfer Station Attendant, has had the Kids Can Recycling Challenge, the Santiago Day Informational booth and Bin giveaway, and placement of Recycling bins for the Administration offices. We encourage recycling every month in the SIP bulletin and have resources available if you need help determining what is and what is not recyclable. We encouraged the community to recycle by establishing centralized Recycling in our Administration offices, Recycling bins are available at events, and distribution of recycling bins for recycling at home. At our most recent audit in September, we received great news that our efforts are working. The audit showed we had significantly REDUCED our cardboard, aluminum cans and plastic bottle waste.

So, San Ildefonso Pueblo, we can do it. Our goals for 2024 are to increase our recycling challenge participant rates, signage at the Transfer Station, tackle the plastic bags & packaging issues by promoting reusable bags and paper products, research how we can promote composting to reduce food waste, and of course to continue to provide the community with resources that can help REDUCE the amount waste coming in and out of our community.

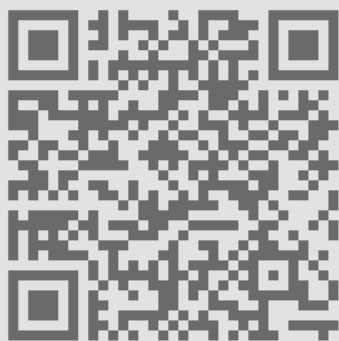

Quitclaim Deeds and Conveyance's

The Master Leases for all housing projects were approved by the BIA Southwest Regional Office, SIHA will now prepare Quit Claims for the homes that are eligible for conveyance, if you are one of these homeowners you will be contacted for signatures within the next 60 days.

Questions and Answers – Waiting List

I want to apply with SIHA for housing, what kind of housing is SIHA looking to build at Deer Tail Phase 2 (DTVP2)?

SIHA had to approach the DTVP2 project differently due to limited grant funding that SIHA will receive on an annual basis, therefore the 27 homesites at the DTVP2 – 27 homesites will consist of MORTGAGES.

What happens after I submit my application for housing?

SIHA obtains and verifies information from the applicant. The application constitutes the basic record of each family applying for admission. Each applicant will supply the requested information, and attest to the accuracy of the supplied information. SIHA will verify the supplied information and add to the waiting list.

All applications will be referred to Homewise in Santa Fe who will also provide Financial Fitness and Homebuyer Education classes on the San Ildefonso Pueblo (SIHA will notify you when those trainings occur, and they are **mandatory** to move on to the next step).

What number am I on the waiting list?

Applications received are entered on the waiting list by the date received, even though you may be #5 on the waiting list that doesn't mean you are the 5th person to be selected for a home. Selection is based on several factors as stated below.

Who will determine if I'm selected for the DTVP2 home project?

When you complete the training, you will work one-on-one with Homewise who will help determine what Mortgage financing would work best for you based on your ability to pay, income and your credit score. There may be some applicants who aren't ready to move to the phase of Mortgage financing, you may have to work towards improving your credit score or funding source, however you will remain on the waiting list.

If you move to the next phase of determining Mortgage financing the Mortgage company will tell you what amount you are eligible for to build a home or obtain a manufactured home. At this time SIHA will assign a homesite to you in the DTVP2 subdivision.

Will SIHA seek funding to build homes on the San Ildefonso Pueblo?

SIHA will be applying for grants and hopefully awarded to build homes, SIHA is still considered a new Tribally Designated Housing Entity (TDHE). The staff must work up to the capacity level required to be awarded competitive grants. SIHA has applied for the 2023 Indian Community Development Block Grant (ICDBG) for Down Payment Assistance, if awarded this will help the families selected for the DTVP2. It is not known when the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) will announce the awardees.

SIHA is also seeking other funding sources to assist low-income families, SIHA understands there is a need for housing and it's long overdue, however everything has a process and SIHA must adhere to that process.

I applied with Northern Pueblos Housing Authority, where is that application?

No applications were transferred to SIHA, and it is not known where those applications are located, therefore, SIHA must start from square one. At this point SIHA needs applicants to show a need for housing on the San Ildefonso Pueblo, therefore you are encouraged to submit an application.

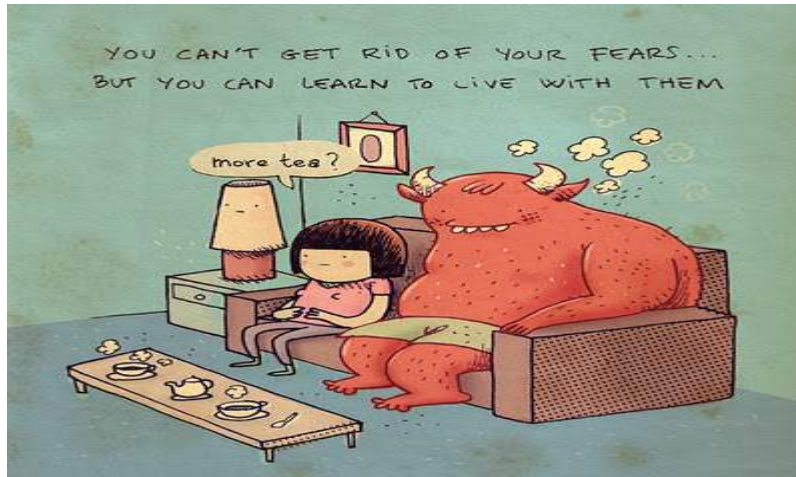
