CEMETERY UPDATE

Reason for New Cemetery

For years there has been a need for a new cemetery due to the overcrowding of the existing site. It has been the practice of our people to bury our relatives and others that were part of the community in the cemetery in front of the church however, when new graves are dug, existing remains are unearthed and disturbed. In some instances, recent graves are still fresh and when new graves are dug they are adjusted as best as possible to avoid further disturbance even though they can be as shallow as 3 to 4 ft. The situation is urgent with new burials disturbing old ones, and no space left to develop.

As a remedy to this issue, it was asked that the appointed church officials develop a plan for a new cemetery location that can allow our loved ones to have a resting place that will be free of disturbance for many years to come.

Location

Five different sites have been reviewed as suggested by both kivas, traditional leaders, and Tribal Council. Ultimately the coral site (as shown in photo) was determined by the church fiscals to be the best option.

Community Meeting

The church fiscals presented this determination to the Community at a meeting held on March 29, 2025 at the Tewa Center. They described the 2-year process of study and evaluation leading to this presentation.

Community members were able to gain information, comment and share their thoughts about the new proposed cemetery. Community members provided verbal consensus to designate the coral site as the new cemetery location and gave the fiscals their blessing to officially designate the site and move forward with the development process.





PUEBLO DE SAN ILDEFONSO COUNCIL RESOLUTION NO. SI-R25-003

CEMETERY DESIGNATION ACT OF 2025

At a duly called meeting of the Council of San Ildefonso Pueblo on the 23rd day of May , 2025, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Pueblo has identified the need to address the overcrowding issues at the current cemetery due to the limited space available for new burials and the need to avoid any disturbance of existing graves; and.

WHEREAS, beginning in February 2023, the Pueblo initiated a public process to determine whether an expansion of the existing cemetery could be accomplished or whether a new location for a cemetery should be identified ("Project"); and,

WHEREAS, in July 2023, the Pueblo conducted a public meeting about the Project; and,

WHEREAS, the public discussion about the Project has included church officials. Pueblo officials and employees, traditional leaders of the Pueblo, and the general public; and,

WHEREAS, the traditional leaders of the North Kiva and the South Kiva ("Traditional Leaders") were consulted throughout the process, including the efforts to select a suitable location for a new consetrer and

WHEREAS, the Pueblo's Realty Office ("Realty Office"). Department of Environmental and Cultural Preservation ("DECP"), and Tubbal Historie Preservation Office ("THPO") were included in the discussions involving the Project to determine if the lands under consideration for a new cemetery were legally available, not likely to cause environmental harm to the water table and other resources, and did not contain any culturally significant sites; and.

WHEREAS, the Pueblo also consulted with outside experts regarding the siting of a new cemetery including a professional cemetery Planner who provided helpful insights into the details and issues involved in establishing a new cemetery; and,

WHEREAS, after extensive consultation with interested parties, the Pueblo reached a preliminary recommendation about the Project that identified four (4) possible locations for a new cemetery since expanding the existing cemetery in front of the church was not an option due to the existing gravesites, archeological sites, and limited space available; and,

Next Steps

- Now that the community has spoken and recommends moving forward, the Governor and Tribal Council will need to execute land and money resources to start the process of creation.
- Governor and Tribal Council and take steps for a council resolution to begin a process for identifying land, and identifying funds to plan, design, and build a new cemetery. (The Council passed Resolution No. SI-R25-003 CEMETERY DESIGNATION ACT OF 2025 at a Council Meeting on Friday, May 23, 2025 designating the coral site, consisting of approximately 2 acres of land, as the location for the new cemetery).
- Church officials will be included in the planning and development process along with Governor and Tribal Council moving forward, and expect to involve the community again at that point in time.





CAUTION!



Please be mindful of changing conditions in the natural environment. Increased temperatures can lead to increased wildlife activity. Please exercise caution, especially in areas with dense vegetation or near water sources. The warmer weather increases the risk of wildfires and impacts vegetation management efforts. Please report any unusual wildlife behavior or environmental concerns.

The Tribal Rangers continue to monitor the situation closely and are working to mitigate the impact on land, livestock, wildlife, and the community.

Stay Safe in the Heat!

As temperatures rise, so does the risk of heat-related illnesses, including heat exhaustion and heat stroke—serious conditions that can become life-threatening if not addressed quickly.

Be Aware of the Signs:

- Heat Exhaustion: Heavy sweating, weakness, cold or clammy skin, nausea or vomiting, and fainting.
- Heat Stroke: High body temperature (103°F or higher), hot and dry skin, rapid pulse, confusion, and unconsciousness.

Heat stroke is a medical emergency. Call 911 immediately if you suspect someone is suffering from it.

Protect Yourself and Others:

- Stay hydrated—drink water regularly, even if you're not thirsty.
- Avoid strenuous activity during the hottest parts of the day.
- Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing and a wide-brimmed hat.
- Take breaks in the shade or air-conditioned areas.

Check on elderly neighbors, children, and pets. Let's work together to keep our community safe. Know the signs. Stay cool. Stay safe.

Our team has been out across the reservation tackling illegal dumpsites and trash, clearing debris and junk out of the ditches, and helping restore the natural beauty of the shared lands. This hands-on work isn't easy — it takes real grit, long hours, and a strong commitment to protecting our environment.

This information is necessary to ensure proper coordination and monitoring of water usage. Please submit the required details as soon as possible to the Tribal Rangers Office.



The route took us across the Plaza Area. The distance was 0.4 miles, or about 2100 feet, and took about 10 minutes. We encountered only one car the whole way, showing that walking to school on the Pueblo is on the whole very safe.

Walking and biking enable us to incorporate the regular physical activity we need each day into healthy habits that last a lifetime. It's also fun and a great social experience. The kids had a great time!

Upcoming Road Work

As the Pojoaque Basin Regional Water System is being constructed, some of the Pueblo roads will be partially closed.

Work is scheduled to begin on Tuesday, May 27 at the intersection of Than Povi Po and Shumaa Po, then work their way through Than Povi Po in 500-ft segments. During this process, there will be a one-lane closure with flaggers present to manage traffic.

Re: Tewa Language Talking Sessions

The Tewa Language Department is happy to announce a "Talking Session/Discussion" series with some of our pueblo elders, who will be talking our Tewa language in front of our people who want to hear, learn, understand, and ask questions on topics they will be having a conversation on in our language. We be having at least two to three of our elders speaking the language in a session, so that you may listen in and take part in the talks too. I think this should help some you who say, that you only want to listen to people talk our language and ask questions on how things are said and truly pronounced, because some words sound alike, but at times have very different meanings, depending on how it is said and used.

This is a time that you can come and join in these talks, so you may get an understanding of these Tewa words that maybe you've never heard or really understood hearing our language spoken is learning. You may ask questions you've always wanted an answer too, on sayings. So please do come and join in on this series. These classes should only take about 1 to 1.5 hours of your time, and should be fun too. We'll be having this once a week starting Wednesday, June 18, 2025 from 530pm to about 7pm at the Learning Center. I encourage you to please take advantage of this and let's start using our Tewa tun' as much as we can, so that eventually we can start talking a little bit more and NOT be ashamed of talking what we learn and start to know.

I would like to give a big a shout-out of a <u>KUN-DA-WOH-HA</u> to those elders that have said yes, to help out in this talking series for our people. If it was not for them to give of themselves to serve our pueblo with their time and effort to help teach our language this would not be possible. We all feel that our language needs learning by those who really want to learn and understand our tunn' before it might go silent in the not to far future, if we don't do anything about it. With our Creator's help, we can hopefully slowly start to revitalize our San I Tewa tunn', <u>but we have to do this together!!</u>

UPDATE on credit pulls: Homewise can now use "soft pull" credit reports for clients in coaching to seek a mortgage loan pre-approval. Once under contract on a new home and working with a loan officer, there will be at least one "hard credit pull". A soft pull doesn't count as an "inquiry" on a credit report and doesn't affect your score. A hard pull is an official inquiry and will show on your list of recent inquiries with each credit bureau and may take 3-5 points off your credit score- most people get these points back within 30-60 days which is 1 to 2 credit cycles. Having a credit check is industry standard when seeking a loan and a necessary part of the process. POJOAQUE BASIN REGIONAL WATER SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

PBRWS Underground Pipeline Installation – Than Povi Po and Tunyo Po

CONSTRUCTION

As of Tuesday, May 27, 2025, the Bureau of Reclamation's contractor, CDM Smith, and their subcontractor, CF Padilla, are currently performing pipeline construction activities along Than Povi Po and Tunyo Po, within the boundaries of the Pueblo of San Ildefonso, as shown in Figure below.

CF Padilla began installing the 10-inch water line pipeline at the intersection of Than Povi Po and Shumaa Po and is proceeding in 500-foot increments along Than Povi Po.

During construction, travelers and residents should expect one-lane closures, with flaggers on duty to safely manage traffic through the work zones.

Once work is completed on Than Povi Po, construction will continue along Tunyo Po under the same traffic control measures. This construction effort is anticipated to last approximately 3 to 4 months. Traffic delays are expected, and your patience and cooperation are greatly appreciated.

GRID Alternatives is working with San Ildefonso Services to install a new ground mount solar array and a covered area installation in the field across from the DECP/Council building and on the Wellness Center. The new solar array will offset around 80% of the electricity for the buildings, and will save the Pueblo \$15,000 per year on electric bills over the lifetime of the system (25 years).



San Ildefonso Pueblo was awarded 100% of the funding for this project from the Tribal Solar Accelerator Fund.

Additionally, if you are interested we will start providing information about potential projects helping with **fiber installation** and recruiting for tribal members with **water and waste water** system operations. Training for all of these skills will be coming up soon and the fiber project will start construction within the next month.



Treat Me Right

We're taught to treat one another with respect, to walk gently with our words, and to care for the wellbeing of the whole circle—young and old. But even in strong communities, hurtful behavior can show up—sometimes in ways we don't notice, and sometimes in ways we've learned to ignore. This kind of behavior doesn't only happen among children or teens. It can happen at any age—and it can cause harm no matter who it comes from.

What Can Hurtful Behavior Look Like?

These are some common examples that can happen at school, work, in families, or community spaces:

- Teasing someone in ways that embarrass or shame them
- Ignoring or leaving someone out on purpose
- Spreading gossip or private information behind their backs
- Dismissing someone's voice because of their age or gender
- Speaking in a way that's disrespectful, shaming, or dismissive
- Saying "It's just a joke" when someone's feelings are clearly hurt

Sometimes people don't mean to hurt others. Other times, they may not care. Either way, the impact matters more than the intention.

How It Affects Us

Being on the receiving end of this kind of behavior can lead to:

- Feeling unsafe, anxious, or embarrassed
- Pulling away from friends, family, or community
- Losing confidence or trust
- Conflict between generations or within groups

When this kind of harm continues, it weakens the circle. It creates silence, tension, and pain that can carry forward to the next generation.

We All Have a Role in Creating Respect

- Elders model what respect looks like in speech and behavior
- Adults carry responsibility to speak up and support those who are struggling
- Young people bring fresh eyes and are learning how to treat others with care

No matter our age, we can all:

- Speak with kindness and listen fully. Everyone deserves to be heard.
- Pay attention to how our words land. Even teasing can cause pain.
- Apologize when needed. It's a sign of strength to make things right.
- Reach out for support when we need it and ask for help. If something doesn't feel okay, you don't have to carry it alone.

Let's keep our relationships strong. Let's teach and model respect. Our words and actions today shape our people tomorrow.
