Important Notice to Our Community: Proper Waste Disposal for the New Septic System

To ensure our new septic system operates efficiently and safely, we kindly ask all community members to avoid disposing of the following items:

Please DO NOT dispose of the following in the septic system:

- **Grease** (cooking oils, fats)
- **Feminine Products** (tampons, pads, etc.)
- **Cleaning/Toxic Chemicals** (bleach, drain cleaners, etc.)
- **Trash** (paper towels, diapers, etc.)
- **Food Waste** (leftovers, scraps)
- **Medication** (pills, ointments)
- **Plastics** (bottles, bags, etc.)
- **Needles** (sharps)
- **Cigarette Butts**
- **Hair** (from combing, shaving, etc.)

We have come across some items that can seriously damage our system. Additionally, we've noticed that **thick toilet paper**, such as Charmin, is too thick and has been getting stuck in the system. To help prevent blockages and ensure smooth operation, we kindly ask the community to **please consider switching to thinner or biodegradable toilet paper.**

Some options for Biodegradable toilet paper:

- Scott, Scott dissolving
- Seventh Generation
- Bamboo Toilet Paper

These actions will help prevent clogs, damage, and costly repairs, ensuring that our septic system continues to work properly for years to come.

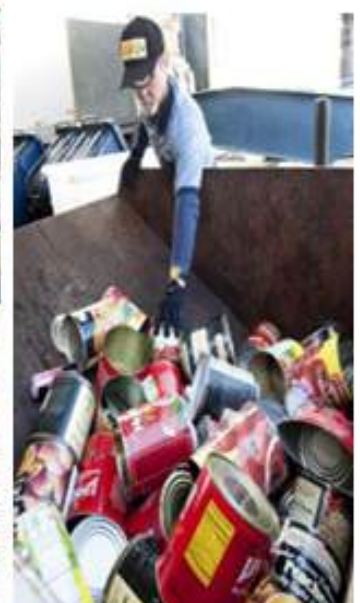

NATIVE AMERICAN ART INSTALLED IN THE WELLNESS CENTER

The Pueblo recently worked with **Art in Public Places** to purchase two paintings from artist Felix Vigil, which are now installed in the Wellness Center. Felix is a distinguished artist of Jicarilla Apache and Jemez and heritage, where he was raised. His work is infused with the rich traditions and spiritual narratives of his ancestors:

"Ideas for my work come out of the ceremonies, songs and stories of my people. It is inspired by ideas that are very old, but those concepts are still very relevant today. I consider my work contemporary meditations on ancient themes that depict traditional symbols in their essential forms and bring them to live with saturated colors and stylized representations of animals and geographic features of the land. Each piece that I create evolves incrementally, according to its own life cycle."

Indian Health Service (IHS)

Application for Sanitation Facilities (Water and Sewer Service) **Scattered Housing**

Public Law 86-121 allows Indian Health Services to assist members of federally recognized native tribes to access a potable drinking water supply and a safe means of disposing of wastewater for their home use.

The IHS has a Scattered Housing program to address these residential deficiencies. You may be eligible if your home meets basic standard of living requirements for example, its insulated, has electricity, indoor plumbing, etc. and your home meets the eligibility requirements of the Indian Health Service.

If you are in need of potable drinking water or a waste water system, please reach out to the Office of Project Management or the Tribal Administration Front Desk for an application.

A completed application consists of the following:

- 1) Tribal enrollment number.
- 2) Signed "Agreement to Participate in IHS Project."
- 3) Proof of your legal right to reside on the subject property
(i.e. copy of lease, deed, or letter from the Tribe indicating that you have been assigned this land).
- 4) If the application is for a HUD Home, the home must be paid off before qualifying for this program.

A statement from the San Ildefonso Housing Authority is required to verify payoff.

- 5) Obtain the signature of the Governor or Tribal Administrator on the application to certify Tribal approval of the application.

- Grandmother..... Sah-ya
- Great Grandfather..... Ta Sedo
- Great Grandmother..... Yi-yá Quee-yo
- Uncle..... Meh-meh
- Aunt..... Ko'o
- Relatives..... Maatu-in'
- Man..... Sang
- Woman..... Quee
- Boy..... Eh-nu'
- Girl..... Ah-nu'
- People/Native people..... Towa
- Pray..... Yuu-su'

Our Tewa Tunn' is not an official written language, but this is the way that I spelled these words, as to how I say it and/or hear it. You may spell it a little differently, and that's OK, but at least I hope you'll get the just of it.

OFFICE OF NATURAL RESOURCES (P. 2)

BIG GAME HUNT MEETING

A meeting will be scheduled for August to discuss updates, boundaries and additional information. Hunters will be notified of when the date and time of the meeting is scheduled.

LAKE UPDATES AND FISH STOCK

Lake maintenance will be completed with the installation of new aerators and a pump. A fish stock will be scheduled shortly. The lake is currently open Friday through Sunday, 8am to 4pm. We appreciate your patience during the construction and maintenance repairs.

FIRE

Due to the current conditions in New Mexico, we have issued a no-burn ban. The combination of dry conditions and recent monsoonal moisture has influenced fire behavior. Some areas have experienced reduced activity due to rain. Wildland fire activity remains high, so to ensure the Pueblo and surrounding areas stay protected, we issued the no-burn ban until further notice.

ANIMAL WELFARE

Animal welfare refers to the responsibility humans have to provide for animals' well-being. This goes beyond the basics of food and shelter; it includes protecting animals from unnecessary suffering, providing veterinary care, and ensuring that animals can express natural behaviors.

- 1. Ensuring access to fresh water and a nutritionally adequate diet to maintain health and strength.**
- 2. Providing an appropriate environment with shelter and a comfortable resting area.**
- 3. Preventing injuries and illnesses and ensuring that animals receive treatment when needed.**
- 4. Allowing animals sufficient space and providing environments that enable them to engage in behaviors natural to their species.**

Fire Weather Advisory – Elevated to Near-Critical Conditions

Due to hot, dry, and windy weather, fire danger in Pueblo has increased to near-critical levels.

Community members are asked to:

- Avoid activities that create sparks or open flames.
- Limit use of outdoor power tools during peak heat hours.
- Do not burn trash, weeds, or debris.
- Report smoke or fire immediately to Tribal Rangers

Fire restrictions remain in place, and conditions are being monitored.

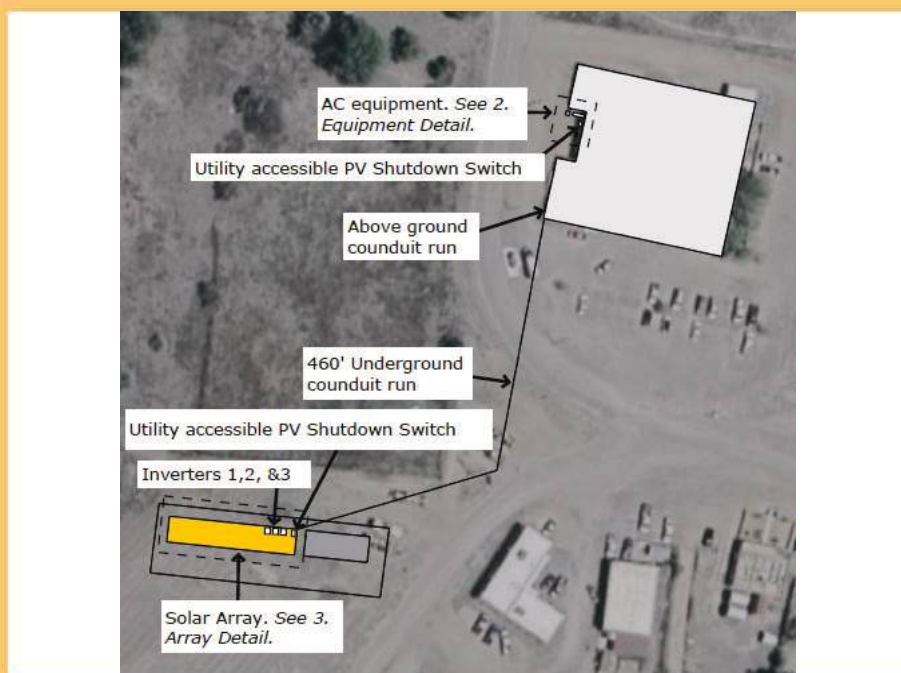

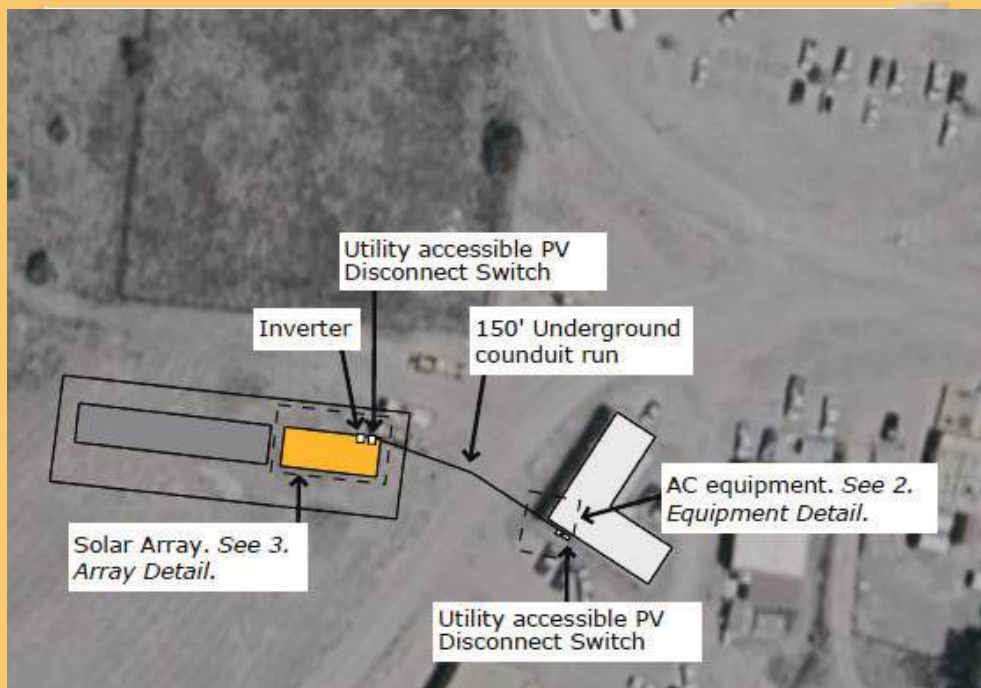

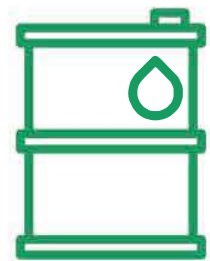
